The 33rd Singapore Pharmacy Congress (SPC), organized by the Pharmaceutical Society of Singapore (PSS), was a resounding success, bringing together close to 1000 attendees at the Grand Copthorne Waterfront Hotel. This year's theme, "Interlacing Health: Weaving the Future of Pharmacy," focused on the pivotal role of pharmacists in addressing healthcare challenges, particularly as Singapore and the world face the pressures of super-aging populations and rising healthcare costs.





The congress, graced by Guest of Honour Professor Kenneth Mak, Director-General of Health at the Ministry of Health Singapore, and Keynote Speaker Professor Tracey Thornley, featured four thematic tracks centered around person-centered, valuebased care.



It emphasized harnessing digitalisation, automation, and AI to co-create innovative healthcare solutions. The congress provided participants with the opportunity to explore interdisciplinary collaborations with healthcare professionals and industry leaders.



One of the key highlights was the launch of the inaugural SGHackitRx 2024 - Ageing Well: Super-Aged Innovation for This Societies. hackathon brought pharmacists together with professionals from various fields to solve 16 pressing healthcare problems related to aging. The finalists were given the opportunity to further develop their ideas in start-up accelerators.

The Congress also hosted the Pharmacy Residency National Graduation Ceremony and the inaugural Outstanding Residency Faculty Award Presentation. During the breakfast symposium, pharmacy residents had the opportunity to showcase their research projects to a broader audience, further emphasizing the congress's commitment to fostering innovation and professional development within the pharmacy community.





Finally, the 33rd Singapore Pharmacy Congress (SPC) 2024, also saw the official launch of the Pharmacy Leadership Development Strategy (PLDS) by the Chief Pharmacist's Office, Ministry of Health Singapore. This initiative is designed to equip pharmacists with the leadership skills needed to navigate the evolving healthcare landscape and drive forward key changes in the pharmacy profession. The PLDS will serve as a roadmap to develop future–ready pharmacy leaders who can spearhead innovation and elevate the role of pharmacists in the healthcare system.

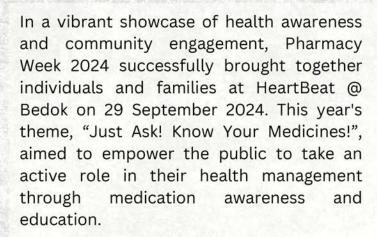

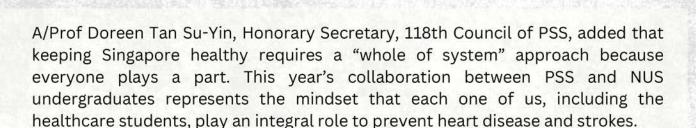

ENGAGING THE PUBLIC @ NLB: GREEN HEALTHCARE FOR A GREENER TOMORROW





A campaign "Green Healthcare for a Greener Tomorrow" was recently launched by the PSS Public Education Chapter in collaboration with the National Library Board (NLB).

This inaugural campaign led by Mr Desmond Teo (PSS Public Education Chapter) kicked off on 28 August 2024 with an online education talk that captured the attention of over 60 keen listeners. Our engaging speakers Ms Grace Kng (Watson's Personal Care Stores Ptd Ltd) and Ms Loh Chee Pheng (KK Women's and Children's Hospital) shared their insights on the management of minor ailments like cold, cough and flu, COVID-19 and paediatric eczema, as well as tips on more "sustainable" selfcare strategies for preventing symptoms, which reduce reliance medication could on symptomatic treatment.

This was followed by an in-person upcycling workshop held Jurong Regional Library (JRL) on 1 September 2024, where enthusiastic participants discovered the joy of transforming bottles old medication into miniature gardens of edible microgreens. With expert guidance from local urban farm Edible Garden City, purple basil micro coriander and were cultivated, proving that sustainability can be both fun and delicious.

The main event was an exhibition at Jurong Regional Library over September 2024, which captured the attention of over 900 visitors.

Educational posters on how to "Check, Sort, and Dispose" expired or unwanted medication were featured. These posters were created by Miss Ong Wei Kii and Mr Boey Teng Ngee from NUS Department of Pharmacy and Sciences Pharmaceutical (with guidance from Dr Golda Wang, Ms Deborah Chia and Dr Yap Kai Zhen from PSS Public Education Chapter).

Additional posters from the "Know Your Meds" series by the Ministry of Health were also displayed, to emphasize the importance of medication adherence and appropriate management in reducing unnecessary medication wastage.
